
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Description: Offered: Sp (odd-numbered years). From poetic romantic landscapes to realistic

literature in English will be included. LAS International/Intercultural. Prerequisites: ENG 108 or

Course Objective: Become familiar with characteristics used to define Romanticism and Victorianism, representative authors, and their works (selected).

The paper (minimum 5 pages, double spaced, Times New Roman, MLA format) must be submitted in hard copy and in Moodle by February 13. Notes will also be submitted in hard copy on <u>February 13</u>.

You must have working notes in class on February 13 and each day thereafter, with the completed paper due <u>February 27</u>. The paper (minimum 5 pages, double spaced, Times New Roman, MLA format) must be submitted in hard copy and in Moodle by February 27. Notes will also be submitted in hard copy on <u>February 27</u>.
