## **Course Requirements**

1. Weekly Blogs--You will be assigned a weekly reading for which you will construct an essay in your personal blog addressing a specific topic. You must complete 12 such essay blogs; these should be posted by Sunday of each scheduled week. The blog should be at least the equivalent of two double-spaced pages Times New Roman 12. You will use internal citations and create a bibliographical entry for any resource used.

Blog work has been structured to deliver writing instruction content; your careful use of this material will help you to mature as a writer.

You will receive up to 25 points at mid-term and finals for your work in these blogs.

2. Research Essays--You will demonstrate your understanding of argument and research by writing 2 research essays on assigned topics. The first essay should be 5-7 pages (double-spaced in Times New Roman 12; the second should be 7-10 pages. The first essay should use 3-5 properly

documented resources; the second should use 5-7 properly documented resources. You will receive up to 25 points for each research essay.

**Class Policies**

You should review other tutorials then become familiar with the course weekly layout in Moodle.

Generally, you should expect to complete the same work for online courses that you would complete in a traditional classroom. You should login the first day classes begin during a semester and frequently thereafter. All work should be completed and posted by the due date. Additionally, you should review informational articles and videos, complete suggested reviews, and generally demonstrate you have a good grasp of the course as a whole.

UNIVERSITY STATEMENT ON ATTENDANCE: "Missouri Western State University has the expectation that students should be active participants in their coursework. Traditional Class: You are expected to come to <u>all classes</u> prepared (having read assigned work and completed any assigned activities or projects) and ready to contribute to class work and discussions. You are allowed three absences (illness, university-sanctioned activities) for this course. At the fourth unexcused absence, you will receive no more than an earned C in the course and may risk failure. There will be no exceptions.

Students representing the university at officially sanctioned activities must inform me before their absence. All absences due to illness must be documented. Documentation must be presented immediately after the student returns to class.

In the event that any class is canceled by the University due to weather, students will be expected to complete class work as stipulated on the syllabus and in Moodle. It will be expected that attendance will be recorded by logging into Moodle on that day.

ONLINE CLASS: You will be expected to login to Moodle regularly. It is extremely important that you login on the day that classes begin at Missouri Western. You will be asked to confirm your attendance during the first week of class and by doing so also confirm that you have read the syllabus and gained an oversight of the Moodle environment and class requirements. You are expected to submit all required work and participate in group work as stated on the syllabus and within the Moodle environment.

Plagiarism is a specific kind of academic dishonesty in which you take another's ideas or words and claim them as your own (P. 48 Handbook). When you draw on someone else's work, you must indicate the source of that material, whether you are repeating another's words, argument or thought. Even if you paraphrase another's work and are not using the exact wording, you are still required to indicate the source of the material. This material must be clearly identified with appropriate citations. If you do not do that, you have plagiarized those materials. Any time you copy and paste any writing that is not your own for an assignment, you must use quotation marks and give the source of that material. If you cut and paste without noting what you have done, you will be guilty of plagiarism. Even if the writing is your own, if it has been used for a previous assignment that should be indicated.

CIVILITY AND COOPERATION: Missouri Western requires all students to maintain good conditions for teaching and learning. All students will treat their classmates, teachers, and student assistants with civility and respect, both inside and outside the classroom. Students who violate this policy may, among other penalties, be counted absent and asked to leave either temporarily or permanently based on the seriousness of the violation.
